

Basic requirements to apply for U.S. naturalization?

- At least 18 years old;
- Be a permanent resident for a certain amount of time (usually 5 years but less for some individuals);
- No absence from U.S. for more than 6 months;
- Good moral character;
- Have basic knowledge of U.S. history and government;
- Read, write, and speak basic English.

→ \$80.00 = biometrics fee

You must answer <u>6</u> out of <u>10</u> civics questions correctly.
